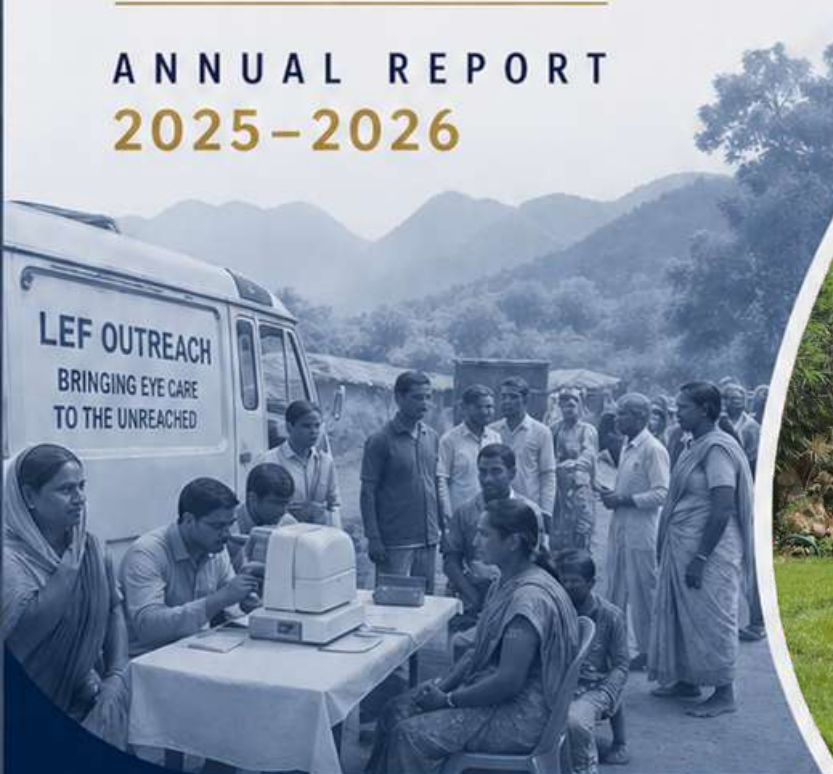

Walked into remote tribal villages



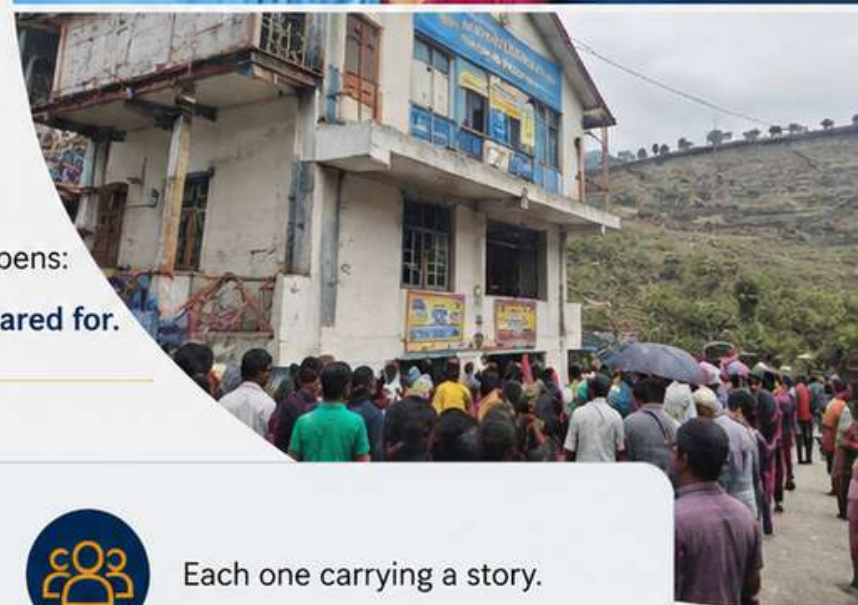
Crossed difficult terrains

CASE STUDY

2025–2026



Malati Sahis, a humble resident of Kashipur Napara in Kashipur, Purulia, had been living in a world of fading light for nearly five long years. As her vision dimmed, so did her independence. Simple, Simple daily tasks became overwhelming, and due to financial hardship, seeking medical care remained an unfulfilled hope.

Her life took a hopeful turn when her son learned about a **free eye screening camp** organized by Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation in Kashipur. Holding on to this opportunity, he brought his mother to the camp—perhaps not knowing that this decision would change her life forever.

During the examination, it was discovered that Malati Devi was suffering from cataract, the very cause behind her prolonged suffering and blurred vision. When the condition and its treatment were gently explained, she gathered the courage to say yes to surgery.

Soon after, she underwent a successful cataract operation at our hospital.

Today, Malati Devi sees the world clearly again. More importantly, she has regained her independence and dignity. She can now manage her daily activities on her own—something that once seemed impossible. The smile on her face reflects not just restored vision, but a renewed life.

Filled with gratitude, she has expressed her heartfelt thanks to the hospital and the entire team whose care and compassion helped her step out of darkness and into light once again.

Bibhas Chandra Bauri, a hardworking daily wage laborer from Kashipur in Purulia district, has always relied on his physical strength and determination to support his family. As the sole breadwinner, his daily earnings from fieldwork and odd jobs were the only means of sustaining his household.

But over the past two years, his life slowly began to change. As his vision faded, so did his ability to work. Tasks that once felt routine became increasingly difficult, and opportunities for work began to slip away. With diminishing income came growing financial hardship, placing immense pressure on him and his family. For Bibhas, it was not just his eyesight that was at risk—it was his family's survival.

Hope arrived when Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation organized a free eye screening camp in Kashipur. Gathering courage and with a sense of desperation, Bibhas attended the camp. There, after a thorough examination, he learned that he was suffering from cataract—the very cause behind his failing vision.

Case Study 1

Chhaya Kumbhakar, a 14-year-old student in Class 8, comes from a humble background. Her father, Dilip Kumbhakar, is a poor farmer who sustains their family through his modest earnings. Every day, Chhaya courageously travels 10 kilometers to school on her bicycle. However, she faced immense struggles due to severe myopia (minus power), which left her unable to see clearly.

With no one at home to accompany her—her father being occupied with farming—it became extremely challenging for Chhaya to manage her daily commute and focus on her studies. In school, her vision problems made it difficult to read or write when teachers gave instructions. The family's financial constraints meant they could not afford a pair of glasses, leaving Chhaya feeling helpless and limited in her efforts to learn.

A ray of hope came on November 24, 2024, when a free eye camp was organized in her village by Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation. Chhaya visited the camp and, to her immense joy, **received a pair of glasses at no cost**. This small yet life-changing gift brought tears of happiness to her eyes. With her vision restored, she now confidently rides her bicycle to school and is thriving in her studies, filled with renewed enthusiasm and determination.

This remarkable transformation was made possible by the generous collaboration of the **Shrimad Rajchandra Love and Care Foundation**, whose unwavering support enabled this large-scale screening. A heartfelt thank you to everyone who contributed to bringing hope and light into Chhaya's life.

Case Study 2

In a small village named Bhalobasa, located in the Purulia district under the jurisdiction of Manbazar police station and Kashidi post office, lived **Rakhal Majhi**. He was a poor farmer and daily wage laborer. His father, Shripati Majhi, had passed away a few years ago, leaving Rakhal with full responsibility for his family. He had a wife, two daughters, a son, and his widowed mother. Despite his hard work, the little farming he managed to do was not enough to provide rice for the entire year.

To support his family, Rakhal started working at a small grocery shop in the village, earning only 150 rupees per day by working from morning until night. Somehow, this meager income helped him keep the household running. However, recently, Rakhal began facing a major problem—he couldn't see clearly. His blurred vision made it difficult for him to perform his tasks at the shop, and his employer started becoming dissatisfied with his work.

Though the shop owner advised Rakhal to seek medical help, Rakhal didn't have the money to visit a doctor or buy glasses. He felt helpless and worried about losing his job, which was the only source of income for his family.

At this critical time, a ray of hope arrived in the form of a free eye camp organized by Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation at the Comedy Primary School. Doctors from Para Eye Hospital came to the camp, offering free eye check-ups and glasses to those in need. Rakhal attended the camp, and after a thorough check-up, he was **given a pair of glasses—completely free of cost.**

With his new glasses, Rakhal's life changed for the better. He could see clearly again and perform all his tasks at the shop with precision and efficiency. His employer was happy with his work, and Rakhal felt relieved and grateful. The glasses not only restored his vision but also brought back his confidence and hope for a brighter future.

Rakhal is now very happy and deeply thankful to the doctors and staff of Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation. He also extends his heartfelt gratitude to the **Shrimad Rajchandra Love and Care Foundation**, whose support made this free eye camp possible. Case Study 3

This man's name is **Shyam Sutradhar**, and he is 35 years old. Sam lives in Namopara, Purulia, and works as a carpenter. His household consists of his elderly parents, his wife, and two young daughters. With no other source of income, his carpentry work is the sole means of supporting his family. His elder daughter is of marriageable age, but due to a lack of funds, he has been unable to arrange her marriage. Managing his household has become a constant and heartbreaking struggle.

For a long time, Sam needed glasses to improve his vision but could not afford them because of his financial difficulties. His deteriorating eyesight made his work even more challenging, adding to his stress and worries.

In October 2024, a ray of hope appeared when a free eye camp was organized by Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation in his village. Shyam attended the camp, where doctors from the local Para Eye Hospital conducted a thorough eye check-up and provided him with a **pair of glasses—completely free of cost.**

Receiving the glasses brought immense joy and relief to Shyam. His vision improved significantly, allowing him to work more effectively and without the constant strain. Overwhelmed with gratitude, Shyam expressed his heartfelt thanks to **Shrimad Rajchandra Love and Care Foundation** for their life-changing support. In a significant milestone, **Nanritam Vocational Training Centre**, (Nanritam VTC) a new unit under Nanritam has been set up to impart **Skill training** for all sorts educationally qualified in the field of **Eyecare, Teacher's Training and Agriculture**, Especially **Ophthalmology and Optometry training** and various branches of the students who have interested to uplift and advance their career from existing level for the past one year.

Nanritam VTC received affiliation from the **National Council for Vocational and Research Training (NCVRT)**, enabling the launch of a structured Diploma in Ophthalmic Assistant training program—an initiative that integrates healthcare delivery with sustainable livelihood creation.

At Lokeswarananda Eye Foundation, Para, Purulia, the mission of eye care extends far beyond clinical services—it is **deeply rooted in restoring hope, dignity, and opportunity**. Since 2008, this 100-bedded charitable super-specialty eye hospital has served as a cornerstone of accessible and compassionate healthcare for underserved communities.



**SKILLED TODAY.
HEALING TOMORROW.**





The inaugural batch of **37 trainees**, predominantly young women from economically disadvantaged rural backgrounds, reflects the untapped potential within these communities. With **completely free training**, along with **food and lodging**, the Foundation has removed critical financial barriers, allowing these individuals to pursue skill development with dignity and confidence.



Nanritam VTC is conducting regular theory classes, **4 classes in a week** of one hour each throughout the year, at its VTC Class Room, maintaining regular record of attendance.



Beside this, there were Practical Classes for all trainees **two hours in a week** and on job training throughout the year both in-hospital and in outreach camps.



Total **4 internal assessment tests** conducted and the performance of each student was documented.



These dedicated trainees are scheduled to appear for their final examination commencing from **20th April 2026**. For many, this marks a life-changing transition - from limited opportunity to professional identity, financial independence, and self-reliance. Several are expected to secure employment within the institution and across other healthcare facilities, creating a multiplier effect of socio-economic upliftment.



This initiative stands as a powerful model of impact-driven healthcare—**advancing women's empowerment, strengthening the rural eye care workforce, and delivering long-term community transformation**. It reflects the Foundation's unwavering commitment to not only restoring vision, but also shaping brighter futures.
